WELCOME

Welcome to the Thirty-third New Jersey Synod Assembly. Please read this Bulletin of Reports so you may be an informed Voting Member.

Assembly Vocabulary No Accident

It is important to note and remember that no delegates will be present for the assembly. "Voting members" are not delegates!

- The terminology related to the legislative process of this church is no accident.
- The words "Synod Assembly," rather than convention, and "Voting Members," rather than delegates, were deliberately chosen for our governing documents.

These words not only fulfill certain legal requirements, but also reflect that the ecclesial understanding of the three primary expressions of this church—congregations, synod, and church-wide organization—exist and serve within this *one church*.

The people of this synod are not sent as delegates; they are *not* gathered to act as some politicized delegates to a regional party convention. Rather, they *assemble* as duly selected members of this church with *voting* responsibilities for governance and elections on behalf of the synod. The Synod Assembly is just that, an assembly of the people of this church, some of whom have been granted the responsibility of being *Voting Members* of the *Synod Assembly*.

The people of this church, when gathered as *Voting Members* of the Synod Assembly, have the responsibility of electing the voting members of the *Church-wide Assembly*. Persons so chosen are given the responsibility of doing the work of the Church-wide Assembly on behalf of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

They are *not* sent to participate as politicized delegates from some regional or agenda-specific caucus at some national party convention.

The vocabulary that we use both shapes and reflects our understanding of this church.

We need to (a) understand more clearly, and (b) embrace more completely the conviction that the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America "shall seek to function as people of God through congregations, synods, and the church-wide organization, all of which shall be interdependent. Each part, while fully the church, recognizes that it is not the whole church and, therefore, lives in a partnership relationship with the others." (ELCA Church-wide Constitutional Provision 8.11.)

Indeed, we together affirm and declare the primary principle of organization of our church, namely: "The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America shall be one church." (ELCA Churchwide Constitutional Provision 5.01)

Within this one church, we, as voting members, advisory members, non-voting members, visitors, and staff will gather to carry out the work of this Synod Assembly.

Pastor Hirsch is working to bring about the revitalization of ELCA congregations in the United States by recruiting, training and supporting leaders. He has a passion for the Gospel of Jesus Christ and for helping new people find faith and Christian community. He believes the church can and will grow younger and more diverse and that there is nothing more powerful than God's love because it can transform first the human heart and then the world.

As Executive Director of Christian Community and Leadership, his responsibilities include; starting new churches, developing congregational vitality, leadership and candidacy, seminaries and colleges, youth and young adult ministries including the national youth gathering, multicultural ministries, disability ministries, and the directors for evangelical mission who work in synods for congregations.

Pastor Hirsch graduated from Susquehanna University, Selinsgrove PA in Sociology and Psychology and received a Master of Divinity degree from the Lutheran School of Theology in Chicago. He earned a Doctor of Ministry from United Theological Seminary in Dayton Ohio in preaching with a focus on alleviating violence in the inner city. He was awarded a Leadership Grant from the Lily Foundation to continue his work and study in South Africa.

Pastor Hirsch was assistant to the bishop and Director of Evangelical Mission for the Metropolitan Washington DC Synod where they launched an effort to grow the synod by 10% and started new churches to make that happen 2009-2019. He was pastor at Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Fairfax, VA 2000-2009 and of Christus, Epiphany, Grace, La Trinidad and New Life Lutheran Churches in Camden, NJ 1990-2000.

He was Vice President of the Camden Lutheran Housing and President of Dooley House, a series of homes for sick children and their families. He was a leader in Camden Churches Organized for People, a church-based community organizing effort that brought millions of dollars to the city for housing, safety and job creating businesses. He worked on the burned churches project with the National Council of Churches.

He is married to Dana M. T. Hirsch and they have three adult sons. He is a cabinet maker and enjoys bicycling, hiking, skiing and photography. He and Dana live in Chicago, IL.

NEW JERSEY SYNOD, ELCA RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE THIRTY-THIRD SYNOD ASSEMBLY

- 1. Fifty percent (50%) of voting members who have confirmed registration upon the beginning of the assembly shall constitute a quorum as required by constitution (S7.14.). Registered Voting Members will receive the access link for Zoom participation. Visitors may view via livestream on the New Jersey Synod website. Microphones should be muted unless a person is recognized by the chair.
- 2. In order to vote, Voting Members <u>must be registered and logged into the virtual</u> Assembly.
- 3. Each attendee is responsible for his or her connection to the internet and the meeting room; no action shall be invalidated on the grounds that the loss of, or poor quality of, a member's individual connection prevented him or her from participating in the meeting.
- 4. Two (2) lay representatives of Synodically Authorized Worshipping Communities and Ministries under Development on the territory of the New Jersey Synod shall be given voice and vote during the Assembly.
- 5. Persons who are on the roster of the New Jersey Synod, ELCA, On Leave From Call or Retired, Living Out-of-State, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations/worshiping communities by special appointment, and those Retired Pastors Living Out-of-State who are actively engaged in the life and ministry of the New Jersey Synod shall be given voice and vote during the Assembly.
- 6. Persons on the roster of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) in a Synod other than the New Jersey Synod, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations by special appointment, shall be given voice, not vote, during the Assembly.
- 7. Persons who are not on the roster of the ELCA, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations/worshipping communities by special appointment, shall be given voice, not vote, during the Assembly.
- 8. Persons who are not on the roster of the ELCA, but who are serving New Jersey Synod congregations/worshiping communities by special appointment and are ordained ministers of another Lutheran church body that is a member of the Lutheran World Federation or of a church body with which a relationship of full communion has been declared and established by a Churchwide Assembly of the ELCA shall be given voice and vote during the Assembly.
- 9. Chairs of Mission Teams and Committees listed by the Synod Council shall be given voice, not vote, on matters pertaining to their work during the Assembly.
- 10. Voting will take place in a variety of ways throughout the assembly. These will include: unanimous consent, google forms, the poll function of zoom, and raised hands. To have an abstention recorded, notify the secretary via the chat function. Abstentions do not count in the vote totals.
- 11. A voting member wishing to make a motion must first be recognized by the chair and then post the motion in the chat box to the secretary so it is in writing.

- 12. When an item of business is opened by the chair for discussion, those voting members wishing to speak shall so do as instructed. Before speaking, each person must indicate their name and congregation name and location. Members must specify if they are speaking for or against the item under consideration.
- 13. Debate shall be limited to two minutes per person per issue. Time will be kept by the Secretary. Debate will terminate when three speakers have been heard on each side, unless otherwise determined by a majority vote of the voting members present and voting of the assembly.
- 14. The deadline for submitting resolutions was March 8, 2021. Late resolutions will not be accepted; any resolutions received after the deadline will be considered by the Synod Council at its next meeting. The Synod Council and/or Executive Committee may submit resolutions directly to the Assembly.
- 15. All resolutions shall be reviewed by the Committee of Reference and Counsel, which, when reporting to the Assembly, may:
 - 1. recommend approval;
 - 2. recommend disapproval;
 - 3. recommend referral to the Synod Council; or
 - 4. recommend a substitute motion to the Assembly
- 16. Due to the online nature of the assembly this year, nominations from the floor will not be accepted.
- 17. All reports published in the Bulletin of Reports shall be received by the Assembly by virtue of that fact without vote.

RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR ADOPTION OF THE 2022 SPENDING PLAN

- 1. At the time of the introduction of the Spending Plan, discussion shall be limited to questions for clarification and information and the serving of notices of intent to move an amendment to the Spending Plan.
- 2. Voting Members desiring to present motions germane to the Spending Plan shall be given until **1:00pm, Saturday, May 8** to submit written notice of such intent to the Chair of the Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee or Treasurer, using the chat function of the meeting platform.
- 3. The Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee shall meet with voting members proposing an amendment.
- 4. At the time appointed for the adoption of the Spending Plan, the Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee shall report to the Assembly all proposed amendments, with the Committee's recommendations.
- 5. When motions germane to the Spending Plan are presented on the Floor of the Assembly, the Fiscal Management, Administration, and Property Committee shall have an opportunity to respond to the recommendations. Any Voting Member wishing to increase a line item in any area of the Spending Plan shall propose a source of funding.

Proposed 2022 Spending Plan

Income Supporting the Spending Plan


Synod income includes Mission Support from congregations, distributions from endowed funds, support from the national church and income from other sources.

Mission Support is the gifts provided by congregations to support the work of our synod. Mission Support provided 88% of the spending plan income in 2019 and is forecast to be 86% of income in 2022.

Restricted Fund draws describes money distributed from restricted funds to synod programs that satisfy those funds' restrictions. This income supports missions within New Jersey, the ULS seminary and Candidacy, Cross Roads Camp, Stewardship programming, and synod property management.

Bank interest was significantly higher in 2019 and 2020 because we set aside money to remove the Cross Roads dam and that money earned interest. We expect to spend that money in 2021.



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Report of the Bishop

New Jersey Synod Assembly 2021

I am about to do a new thing, now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert. (Isaiah 43:19)

What words would you use to describe this past year? I've heard several words too many times; the word unprecedented might lead the list. But we've had to use other words as well. Words that cause us pain like: pandemic, quarantine, white supremacy, positivity rate, insurrection, and Christian nationalism. Positive words have crept into our vocabulary with more regularity: online worship opportunities, Black lives matter, equity, neighborliness, vaccines, and possibilities. The weariness of this past year is seen, and heard, and felt by all of us.

It is into this reality, that we gather as church to hear God's word and celebrate the promises made to our faith ancestors and to us: "I am about to do a new thing, now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." More than any of our words, this word from God's own lips carries us through the challenges we face into the future that is waiting for us. God's declaration of divine activity allows us to breathe a little easier.

As you read through the Bulletin of Reports, you will get a glimpse of the many ways we have continued serving the mission we are called to share throughout the New Jersey Synod. It is a remarkable record of lives changed and shaped by our common ministry. Thank you for being the church this synod, this state, this world needs us to be.

Throughout the year, I met virtually with parish pastors and deacons as well as with lay leaders on several occasions. Each time we met, I heard again of both the great burden you bear and the creative ways you carry on. We welcomed new pastors into our synod, congregations called pastors to serve and bid farewell to those leaving, lay leaders stepped up to become technicians for livestreaming and online education. Our camp, Cross Roads, began online Sunday School each week, which continues to this day and many of you are still participating. Church lawns and town parks became worship and education spaces. Mission Clusters provided joint online worship opportunities while new partnerships among congregations formed to strengthen neighborhood outreach.

As COVID19 continued to wreak havoc on family economics, you stepped up to fill in the gaps, especially with feeding ministries. We dispersed over \$55,000 in grants for congregational food pantries and ministries in vulnerable communities, thanks to the ELCA churchwide organization. Our own synod council approved using designated funds for relief to congregations, issuing over \$156,000 to 26 congregations by mid-March 2021. Many of these loans, which can be converted to grants, have been used for expanded technology so congregations can reach more people with the gospel; some have been used for alleviating financial distress in the congregation.

God is, indeed, doing a new thing and is making a way in the wilderness of this past year. Racist words and actions caught on camera opened eyes to the reality of being Black in America. What some have known all along, others are just beginning to understand – racism is a sin that is baked into our very way of life and something that white people in this church need to confess and eradicate. Our synod has a long history of doing this work and we will continue. At this assembly, we will launch a bishop's challenge

called The Jehu Jones Mission, to educate and repair relationships torn apart by institutional slavery on which this country was founded. Our goal is to raise \$50,000 for leadership opportunities for young Black members of this synod.

Our work to be an anti-racist church isn't just focused on racism against African-Americans; as we have seen, anti-Asian hatred is on the rise, and prejudice against immigrants, especially towards the Latinx community, is real. We are committed to working for the day when all people celebrate the diversity which is part of God's good creation and where we see a church which reflects in its leadership and membership, the full spectrum of humanity.

A year ago, your synod staff began working from home – and we continue there. Creating home office space, which we hoped would be for the short-term, has allowed us to walk with you seamlessly. Phone calls and emails are answered promptly, twice weekly Zoom staff meetings enable us to collaborate, and being connected to the cloud means we have our files at our fingertips. We put together several online worship opportunities that allowed our synod to connect on a Sunday morning in prayer and praise. Questions about how and when we come back in-person are ongoing, but rest assured knowing wherever we are, we are committed to serving with you. I can't thank them enough for the ways they answer the call to serve in Christ's church.

Please join me in thanking your staff: LuAnn Barnes, Executive Administrative Assistant; Lois Parrett, Director of Operations; Dawn Appelget Roberts, Administrative Assistant for Mission and Ministry; Assistants to the Bishop, Pastors Kimberly Vaughn and Dean Brown; Director for Evangelical Mission and Assistant to the Bishop (deployed by the ELCA), Pastor Maristela Freiberg. Pastor Sara Lilja is the Director for LEAMNJ, and this year also took on the role of interim pastor at Holy Communion, Berlin.

Our part-time/contract staff includes: Pastor Becky Resch, Candidacy Support; Matt McDevitt and Robert Poole, Property Managers; Beth Peroni, Supply Pastor Coordinator; and Nicholas and Eugenia Sapon, Custodians.

Thank you for the opportunity to serve as your bishop. Even when the days are long and the road is bumpy, this is the best call in the ELCA. I long to be back in person with you – to worship and celebrate, to sing and dance, to learn and teach, to marvel at the wondrous new things God is doing in your midst. Until that day, I hold you in my prayers and trust you do the same.



Following retirement from that position, Louisa became administrator for graduate studies for Antioch University's Philadelphia satellite program in education and counseling.

Retiring once again from the education field, Louisa began congregational ministry as a lay associate and parish worker at St. Luke, Willingboro, followed by positions with the Camden Lutheran Parish, facilitator for Region 7's multicultural ministry, and parish work at Emanuel Lutheran in South Philadelphia. In 1991, she began her studies at the Lutheran Theological Seminary, Philadelphia where she received a Certificate of Study in 1999, having completed all of the requirements for Word and Sacrament ministry. At the age of 81, the congregation of Redeemer, Jersey City, extended the call as pastor, and on September 12, 1999, according to known Lutheran records, Pastor Groce became the oldest ordinand in the history of the ELCA and its predecessor bodies.

Pastor Louisa Groce retired as pastor of Redeemer in 2009, and moved back to Willingboro. Still very active in ministry, she continued serving as a supply pastor, as well as volunteering with crisis intervention, hospital chaplaincy, and hospice care. Within the Synod, Pastor Groce served on the Bishop's Mutual Ministry Committee, Synod Council, Division for Outreach, and the Namibia Companion Synod team.

Louisa is survived by her daughters Lillian, Evelyn, Joyce, Yvonne and Yvette, and their families.

Treasurer's Report to the 2021 New Jersey Synod Assembly

This report summarizes the New Jersey Synod financial results for 2020. Details of revenue, spending and financial assets are available in the 2020 Financial Statements and Independent Auditor's Report, and as part of the Proposed 2022 Spending Plan.

The New Jersey Synod is 159 congregations and 3 missions that share the ministry of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in the state of New Jersey. Synod programs and staff are supported by monetary gifts from the synod congregations. The synod staff serve to unite, interconnect and support the work of ELCA congregations within New Jersey, and to guide pastoral candidates. All of us together are the New Jersey Synod.

The 2020 Spending Plan was approved at our 2019 Synod Assembly. The spending plan supported:

- ELCA Churchwide ministries and our ministry partners
- Congregations and mission groups within our synod
- Candidacy, pastoral vacancy, congregational call and other synodical processes
- Youth Ministry, Continuing Education and synod action teams

The 2020 year was a challenge to us all. The pandemic created economic uncertainty and health restrictions prevented us from gathering. Although we had to implement many changes to cope with our 2020 realities and we experienced great uncertainty about our circumstances, our financial year turned out okay.


Total 2020 spending plan revenues were \$1.99 million including \$1.75 million in Mission Support. With programs curtailed, no assembly and no gatherings, expenses were less than planned. We ended the year with a \$106,000 surplus.

Mission Support

Mission Support provided 88% of the money for running the synod; 2020 giving totaled \$1.75 million. This was a:

- \$112 thousand decrease compared to 2019
- \$335 thousand decrease compared to 2015
- \$422 thousand decrease compared to 2010

Half of Mission Support goes directly to Churchwide programs; support for churchwide office and international mission programs declined proportionate to the decline in Mission Support. Reduction in synod programs and staff has been a necessary response to mission support declines.



Restricted Funds

In addition to the spending plan, the synod administers money which has been given in trust and designated for specific purposes. Examples of these restricted funds include the Fund for Mission, the Wurffel Fund, the Candidacy Endowment and the Brueckner Outdoor Ministry fund.

The money associated with these funds is managed by an investment committee that reports to the Synod Council. Fund disbursements were approved by the Synod Council and reviewed by our outside auditors. The synod council disbursed about \$913,000 in restricted funds during 2020. Total restricted funds totaled \$10.65 million at the end of fiscal year 2020 compared with \$9.66 million at the beginning of the year.

The synod office also received monies given toward World Hunger and other mission causes. During 2020 we received and forwarded on \$228,000 in restricted gifts for ELCA World Hunger and other mission programs.

Balance Sheet

The balance sheet is a snapshot of the synod's financial condition. At the end of fiscal year 2020:

- Assets totaled \$15.5 million compared to \$14.7 at the end of 2019.
- Fixed assets totaled \$3.86 million.

The synod balance sheet demonstrates that the NJ Synod remains financially healthy.

Financial Audit

The synod contracted Tait Weller & Baker, LLP certified public accountants to review our financial processes and our 2020 financial transactions, and to create our annual financial reports. Tait Weller is new with us this year.

At the conclusion of their examination the auditors will express an opinion on whether the Synod's financial statements were complete and accurate. The synod Audit Committee planned the audit calendar with the goal of publishing the final audit report before this Synod Assembly.

Governance Committees

Thanks to the members of

who gave generously of their time and talents as they oversaw the administration of Synod financial assets, resources, and properties. These ministries were a key part in enabling the New Jersey Synod to advance the goals and mission of our Evangelical Lutheran Church.

Thanks to Lois Parrett who conscientiously and faithfully executed the financial procedures, reconciled accounts and maintained records for the synod. The synod staff and programs would be unable to function without her dedicated efforts.

- Other synodical events where youth are invited (FHL)

- Youth Gatherings (there is a separate ELCA scholarship)
- Confirmation Camp (financial assistance is incorporated in the Cross Roads budget)

MAKING RESOURCES AVAILABLE TO CONGREGATIONS FACING FINANCIAL DISTRESS

Bishop Bartholomew and Treasurer Jim Harris led the discussion of resources for congregations facing financial distress, AKA Covid-19 Loans, beginning with information related to the restricted Funds for Mission, up to \$1 million, that are available. The conversation continued with the criteria and application process, which is for all of 2020, recognizing that a more critical time may come later in the year for some congregations. Treasurer Jim Harris made the point that the loans may be forgiven, converted to grants as a congregation continues in ministry -- for each year of continued vital ministry by 25%, rather than would be forgiven if the situation arose with loan recipients not fulfilling their obligations. The language in the application would reflect the requirements. Congregations may apply for up to \$10,000 each. Criteria:

- 1. Active ministries that benefit the community (esp but not limited to feeding programs, preschool as a ministry of congregation, homeless housing, community gathering place for 12 step groups, etc.)

The proposal follows:

We propose holding five Friendship Camps over nine days in 2020 [compared to seven camps over 12 days in 2019]. Proposed travel dates are Tuesday, June 23, through Wednesday, July 1, to accommodate New Jersey's end of school year. The team leader will be Cindy Henry, a 10-year traveler who has led the Friendship Camp portion of the trip since 2015.

The proposed budget is \$35,418 <u>plus airfare</u>. Calculations assume 15 American travelers, 1 professional musician, 5 interpreters, 2 coordinators, 1 bus driver. If we have more or fewer travelers, the budget will adjust accordingly. [By comparison, 2019's budget was \$63,719 plus airfare for 20 American travelers, 10 interpreters, 2 coordinators, 2 bus drivers, two programs.]

2020 income will come from travel team fees, camp sponsorships (\$2,600 per camp), and general donations.

Details:

- We plan to offer a financial incentive for travelers who commit with a deposit by Dec. 15, 2019, and pay in full by May 15, 2020.
- We plan to apply to the youth ministry team, as we have in the past, for scholarships to award to travelers 25 years old and under.
- As always for this intergenerational trip, we will strive to recruit a team that reflects the diversity of the synod.

We plan to expand the "model camp" experience tested successfully last year at St. Paul's- Hainesport. The event increased both donations and engagement.

NEW JERSEY SYNOD OF THE ELCA STEWARDSHIP REPORT

2021 NJ Synod Assembly

For surely I know the plans I have for you, says the Lord, plans for your welfare and not for harm, to give you a future with hope.

-Jeremiah 29:11

For where you treasure is, there your heart will be also. ~Matthew 6:21

Blessed are you, O God, maker of all things. Through your goodness you have blessed us with these gifts: our selves, our time, and our possessions. Use us, and what we have gathered, in feeding the world with your love, through the one who gave himself for us, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen. -ELW, Offertory Prayer, p. 107

These bible verses and this prayer are but small samplings of the evidence for the centrality of stewardship ministry -its interconnectedness- with all else that we profess is true of God, and what this truth about God creates, instills and elicits within and from us. In other words, and much more has been written and could be written about this -when we engage in stewardship ministry, we need to be clear about 'the why,' with the reason being because it is what God wills for us. It is not that God is in need of 'our' wealth let alone our attention, but that an aspect of the Christian life is being generous with the wealth and attention God has given us. It is the new life in Christ finding expression in what we do. **So often, and at its base, stewardship ministry is starting here, that is, starting with the theological principles of why we give.** And it is not because we try to bend our lives around doctrines or principles. It is to name truths for the sake of thinking clearly, clearly with the mind of Christ shared with us, so that our intention is aligned with the faith given us, and so that our congregational stewardship messages, appeals and teaching is aligned with our intention. That has been one of the primary goals of the NJ Synod's Stewardship Ministry resources and programs. And it remains one of the primary goals.

And so, with this in mind, here is some of what our NJ Synod's Stewardship Ministry resources and opportunities emphasize and endorse:

- Being grounded in sound biblical teaching and Lutheran theological thought.
- That teaching about generosity and how to be generous are closely related yet distinct from one another. And yet they are both necessary parts of stewardship ministry.
- Strong stewardship ministry is directly related to congregational practices such as:
 - Have an annual stewardship appeal that is planned, launched in the course of a month, and then followed up bringing that year's appeal to closure.
 - o Messaging matters learn, teach and practice impact/outcome stories and generosity stories.
 - o Though there is an annual appeal, stewardship is a practice we teach, witness, encourage and speak of year-round. It is one facet of giving thanks for the mission and ministry we share.
 - o Strong stewardship tracks with having a mission/purpose for which you are asking people to give toward.
 - o In addition to having a clear missional identity, narrative budgets and multiple opportunities for giving (i.e. online/electronic) add to the momentum found within generous congregational giving.
 - o Not only do we 'inform' and 'ask' members for their offerings, but we appeal to their hearts while thanking them sincerely.

Very early on in 2020 and due to the pandemic with social distancing requirements, understandably the question was what would stewardship and generosity look like? And through various initiatives such as the Excellence in Ministry Unleashed's (EMU) 'Cultivating Generous Congregations' program offered at the beginning of 2020; and with the NJ Synod's 'Generosity Again' fall stewardship seminar which met six times through zoom; and because of so many faithful leaders within this synod and scattered throughout its congregations -and of course because of God's inspiration and abiding Spirit among us! –that question has been overwhelmingly answered: God's people in this synod continue to be faithful, generous and joyful in those ways they share and

give of themselves.

Thanks!

Looking ahead to 2021, I continue to make myself available to congregations who would like to consult about seasonal and year-round stewardship. In this coming fall, I look forward to making additional stewardship resources and meeting times available to perpetuate this ongoing effort to which we have been called: Generous Living and Giving. Thank you for your generosity!

In fall 2019, perspective members of the Leadership Mission Team met to reorganize and rediscover its purpose as a team, its vision for the future as a result of its work in this synod, its mission focus and to establish concrete goals to live out that mission over the next year.

The Leadership Mission Team lives out its purpose as it accompanies lay and rostered leaders in congregation, strategic and specialized ministry settings by building connections, developing and curating resources so leaders can embrace God's mission and move forward with courage and passion.

The team's vision faithfully imagines what happens, when leaders embrace God's mission. As we embrace God's mission, we hope to see disciples of Jesus inspiring, inviting and challenging the diverse people we lead and serve to live out the fullness of their calling as children of God in Jesus Christ. By using our unique spiritual gifts, experiences, abilities and resources, in the settings to which God has called us, with all our heart, mind and soul, we claim God's redeeming and dignifying work is for all humankind.

As its mission, the Leadership Mission Team sees both the wellness of leaders and a leader's ability to effectively and faithfully inspire the people they serve to move toward a clear vision of God's future in their particular context. At the current time, the Leadership Mission Team recognizes and encourages the many diverse ways this mission is already being fulfilled by a variety of teams at work in the Synod. As it develops its goals, the Leadership Mission Team will continue to focus on the well being and effectiveness of leaders in those contexts as it works to build connections and develop and curate a number of already existing resources for the benefit of both lay and rostered leaders.

The team has developed a survey that asks lay and rostered leaders to reflect on what they feel they need to lead, inspire and motivate the people they serve, as well as what systems they would like to see enhanced or developed to support them in calling as leaders. The questions are open-ended and evocative by design. Look for the survey in your assembly packet or at the coaching table in the mission display area at the synod assembly. In the days ahead a copy of the survey will be emailed to rostered leaders so they can distribute it and encourage its completion by the lay leaders they serve alongside. The survey could make an excellent reflective time for a church council meeting or even a mini-retreat.

The team is in the process of developing an organizational map of the NJ Synod so that leaders might easily see its structure, as well as opportunities and challenges for developing both lay and rostered leadership to serve within this Synod. At the same time, the team is working to graphically represent how the series of relationships that make up the NJ Synod interacts with local congregations and strategic and specialized ministries. In creating and sharing these maps, we hope to help leaders make connections that will assist and support them as they embrace and live out God's mission in the world.

The Mission Advocacy Table has several responsibilities as we accompany congregations as they participate in God's mission on the territory of the New Jersey Synod and throughout the world. While we serve all congregations of our synod, we have primary responsibility for the following:

1. Accompanying and supporting new mission starts through resource development.

This includes finding resources for new mission starts, whether spiritual, physical, or financial. It also means raising up leaders, as well as encouraging and training congregations to grow into faithful mission outposts.

2. Accompanying and overseeing of Strategic Ministry

3. Cultivating Christ-centered Learning Communities

The Mission Advocacy Table is responsible for "cultivating Christ-centered communities where we learn, live, and lead boldly for the sake of the world." This involves creating communities that are transformed by life-changing relationships with God, each other, and the world. Four cohort opportunities for cultivating congregational vitality were offered:

These online gatherings happen between September 2020 and January 2021.

Grants from ELCA LDR Feeding Ministry and the ELCA COVID-19 Special Appeal Finally, The Mission Advocacy Table is thankful to God that our Synod was awarded with the ELCA Lutheran Disaster Response grant to support congregations with robust feeding ministries during the COVID-19 pandemic and the COVID-19 Special Appeal grant to be shared among vulnerable populations. We give thanks to God for the partnership of being church together and sharing \$50,239.86 with congregations that embrace the call to share God's love in Jesus Christ and serve neighbors.

REPORT OF THE YOUTH MINISTRY MISSION TEAM

2021 NJ Synod Assembly

As we entered 2020, the Youth Ministry Mission Team (YMMT) of the NJ Synod was busy planning a new cycle of activities and partnerships under changing leadership. We had successfully held our first ever Synod Youth Retreat for over 170 middle and high school youth and their adult leaders at Fairview Lake YMCA Camp. We invited youth leaders from all over the synod to participate in Youth Mental Health First Ald training at the Cross Roads Shepherd's Gathering. The YMMT spent time together at a retreat at Cross Roads in February, creating a calendar of events that began in the summer and brought a theme through synod, ELCA, and Cross Roads events for elementary through high school aged youth. In early March we set out to visit hotels across central NJ to find a new location for the Synod Youth Retreat, as we had outgrown the YMCA camp. We were certainly on a roll to provide many opportunities for youth across our synod to participate in fellowship, service, and worship.

And then Covid struck. In the early days we continued the work we started. We created a job description for a Youth Ministry Coordinator position that we wanted to share with Synod Council, and we even booked a weekend in November at the Sheraton in Edison for the Synod Youth Retreat. However, it would become clear over the following months that we had to set these plans aside for the reality of frozen budgets and social distrancing that would prevent gatherings such as retreat.

In May of 2020, the YMMT began turning our planning from large-scale in person opportunities to online ways to equip adults in congregations around our synod to work with young people in the pandemic. We began to offer a series of Zoom meetings on a variety of topics:

- May 2020 shared ideas with youth leaders and pastors for engaging young people during quarantine
- June 2020 shared ideas with congregation members involved in Sunday School and VBS ministries
- July 2020 initial ELCA Gathering information meeting (the Gathering was later postponed until Summer of 2022)
- July 2020 anti-racism discussion with youth leaders, shared ideas of how to bring this topic back to the youth
- August 2020 follow up VBS/Sunday School meeting, planning ideas for the fall
- August 2020 21 Day Racial Equity Habit Building Challenge for youth leaders
- September 2020 a second meeting with youth leaders to share ideas and an update on the Gathering
- December 2020 and January 2021 Zoom 2.0 workshops on how to use technology to connect with your congregation

During the summer, 18 leaders from around the synod participated in Growing Young Training offered virtually by the Fuller Youth Institute. This two day training focused on how to develop congregations that "grow young" instead of growing old. The Growing Young team has been working on plans to bring the Growing Young assessment to the synod and interested congregations. The team is also working to create more opportunities for young adults to engage in

ministry opportunities throughout the synod, and we are working closely with Cross Roads to develop these events, either virtually or eventually in person.

In the fall we turned our attention to our scheduled Synod Youth Retreat. We knew that hosting this event at the Sheraton would be not possible, so the planning team adjusted their sails and the first ever virtual Synod Youth Retreat was planned. This successful event spanned 2 days with worship, small group time, and Faith Fair stations around topics that included diversity, managing stress, yoga, and more. Youth in grades 6 - 12 and adult leaders joined us along with musical guest Larry Olson of Dakota Road (a youth ministry favorite) and our first ever chaplain team. Thanks to Alyssa Guateiri for being the coordinator, and to all the people who served on the planning team:

Annemarie Cook, Alex Mack, Jamie Moni, Riley Jakobowski, JJ SImpson-Keelan, Kathryn Schaefer, and Madison Van Houten. The use of a chaplain "team" was really well received.

Chaplains were Annemarie Cook, JJ SImpson-Keelan, Brett Ballenger, Dlanne Lewis, Garth Olsen, and Damaris Ortega. We will use a chaplain team moving forward!

Other fall events for youth in our synod included the Rally for Cross Roads, where folks in their congregations all over NJ spent the morning doing a 5K to raise funds for our camp. We were proud to have Pastor Raymond Kolison and youth Aaron Blanford and Izzy Volpe attend the ELCA Youth Summit in November. Aaron and Izzy shared what they learned about vocation as well as LGBTQ+ issues in the church with the youth at the Synod Youth Retreat, and we look forward to hearing more from them this spring.

In February, the ELCA Youth Ministry Network held their first ever fully virtual Extravaganza for adults in youth ministry. We had several youth leaders from our synod participate in this event, learning and gathering wisdom from many key speakers and workshops. We were especially proud of NJ Synod members Jamie and Rebekah Bruesehoff as two of the keynote speakers from Friday!

At the February Synod Council meeting, our proposal for a Youth Ministry Coordinator for the synod was approved! We had worked on this job description in the spring of 2020 but when the budget was frozen, we had to wait to put forward our proposal. This coordinator position will assist in many areas including planning and registration at events, communications, budget, scholarships, and more. We are excited to work with the Cross Roads staff who will share these responsibilities and to expand upon the partnership we have already built with camp.

We are all grateful for the continued work of the Youth Ministry MIssion Team during this time of pandemic, and for their flexibility in providing opportunities for adults and youth in NJ to stay connected. We thank Anthony Briggs, Annemarie Cook, Jeffery Blanford, Alexandra Mack, Alyssa Guatieri, and Kathryn Schaefer for their continuing work on this team. We are grateful for Michael Linderman and Phoebe Chen who have now ended their time with the YMMT, and are excited to bring on board new members Riley Jakubowski and Jamie Moni. The YMMT remains committed to involving youth and young adults in their planning, with the goal of building leadership skills for the present and future of youth ministry in the NJ Synod.

REPORT OF THE NEW JERSEY SYNOD ANTI-RACISM TEAM

2021 NJ Synod Assembly

In 2018 a group of pastors and lay people gathered to be educated in the Transforming White Privilege Curriculum. A smaller group specifically, Pr. Kimberly Vaughn, Pr. Sara Lilja, Pr. Susan Nelson Colanari, Pr. Wayne Zschech and Dr. Dianne Browne gathered to prepare to conduct curriculum training. In January of 2020 this small group presented the curriculum to approximately 15 clergy who were enthusiastic about its possibilities for engaging congregations in conversations about racial justice.

As COVID-19 came upon us in March 2020, hopes for more trainings were dampened, but members of the group did not give up. After the George Floyd incident, both Pr. Vaughn and Dr. Browne had conversations about the need for the work of an Anti-Racism Team. In September of 2020, the ELCA African Descent Lutheran Association convened a Justice Summit. This summit generated excitement among Pr. Vaughn and Dr. Browne and was the impetus for reassembling the work of the NJ Synod's Anti-Racism Team.

A letter was sent inviting former participants on the NJ Synod's Anti-Racism Team to gather. Others around the state who were working on racial justice issues in their congregations were also invited. The invitation asked folks to consider being part of a re-organized NJ Synod Anti-Racism Team. About seven people responded and planned an Anti-Racism Virtual Summit. The summit was held on Saturday, October 7, 2020 from 10:00 am – noon. Participants were invited to share their questions and concerns, offer advice to each other regarding local efforts, and express what was needed to educate and encourage people to confront racism.

The virtual event was a success with over 70 people participating. Candid thoughts were shared about racism, some showing signs of frustration as well as hope. Feedback from the summit led to more formal meetings of the Anti-Racism Team.

The reconvened team grew from seven participants to twelve and created a plan for engaging congregations in work around racial justice. Summit type events would be held virtually in the year to come to gather ideas, create work groups, and track progress among NJ congregations.

REPORT OF THE NEW JERSEY SYNOD BOSNIA INTERNATIONAL TRAVEL TEAM 2021 NJ Synod Assembly

In March of last year, two dozen members of the 2020 Bosnia International Servant Team gathered for an amazing retreat at Cross Roads to prepare for our trip in June. We sang, played games, and learned to count in Bosnian. We studied history and brainstormed activities to do with the children. Most important, we bonded as a group dedicated to peace and justice.

The next week, the pandemic hit New Jersey.

Like so many things in 2020, our trip was canceled. We had hoped to return to Bosnia this year, but sadly, we now must look to summer 2022.

Every June since 2000, the synod has sent a team of up to 30 people to Bosnia. Team members ranging in age from 15 to 75 travel the country offering one-day Friendship Camps for grade school children. We play games, sing songs, tell stories, share meals, and laugh — a lot.

We also have offered an overnight leadership camp for middle school students and teachers called Camp New Hope. It's a rare opportunity for Bosnians from different regions, ethnicities and religions to talk about the challenges in their communities. They work to restore broken relationships and rediscover common goals.

Both ministries offer hope, healing, and peace for a nation still riven by ethnic conflict.

The 2020 trip would have been a milestone in many ways: It was the 20th anniversary of the ministry within the New Jersey Synod and the first trip organized without its founder, Jason Reed, who left synod staff in fall 2019. The challenges were many: Could the now all-volunteer Bosnia Leadership Team recruit travelers and attract sponsors? Could we establish a firm financial foundation for the future?

Happily, the answer was a resounding yes!

The 2020 travel team — consisting of 26 people from 14 congregations in New Jersey, Pennsylvania and South Dakota — would have been the largest since 2008. Congregants from 15 churches were participating in "home team" activities, including decorating tote bags, donating sports equipment, and sponsoring camps. Team members were sharing the ministry around the synod with temple talks and sample camps.

Though in the end we could not travel, we learned a lot in 2020 and instituted changes for a sustainable future, including robust recruitment, an early registration discount, a strict payment schedule, fund-raising based on matching donations, and scholarships to aid travelers in need.

We're hopeful that in 2022, it will be safe to travel again. The needs in Bosnia remain great. Learn more about our ministry at Facebook/BosniaIST, on Instagram at Bosnia IST, or at www.servanttrips.org.

Looking to enhance your congregation's communication?

During the pandemic, reaching out in a safe way became a challenge for every faith community. Below is a list of things you can do right now to help share your story with your neighborhood:

- 1) You are creating content every week. Make sure to share it via a weekly email newsletter. We recommend MailChimp at https://mailchimp.com/
- 2) Looking to create graphics for social media? Think about using Canva (https://www.canva.com) or the app Bible Lens. Canva provides free pro-accounts to non-profits (including churches!) To get a pro-account for your church, you will need your tax status documentation. You can get that by sending an email to 501c3@elca.org with your church's legal name, full street address and 9-digit Federal Employer Identification Number (EIN). The ELCA's office of the Secretary will send you back 3 pdfs. Combine

- those pdfs into 1 file and use that document to apply for a Canva pro account at https://support.canva.com/account-basics/nonprofit-program/apply-for-nonprofit/.
- 3) Make sure to reach out to your local community newspapers. Regularly send them photos and press releases about what's happening at your church. Try to send them information about upcoming events 3 weeks in advance.
- 4) Use the sign on your building and regularly update your message. Instead of being sentimental in your message, think about how you can form the faith of the person spending 3 seconds driving past your building.
- 5) Create a robust permission form to let children be in your photos. Ask permission and let parents say no.
- 6) Think through the different ways people are interacting with your community. Your weekly email newsletter will be viewed on a smartphone so keep it small, advertising upcoming events and bite-sized ways to build someone's faith. Your monthly printed newsletter should contain long-term plans and longer form faith formation materials. And your social media posts should encourage engagement in ways specific to your community (i.e. making worship last throughout the week, enhancing your prayer ministry, etc).
- 7) Invite people to regularly check-in on social media while at your church. Encourage people to use their phones during worship, especially if they're posting reflections about the sermon, music, and more. If their phone rings during worship, invite them to pick it up and tell the other person on the line:" I'm at my church and you should be here too!"
- 8) Consider using different tools to help with engagement for online worship. The NJ Synod in early 2021 hosted a series of workshops to help with engagement. Tools you might consider exploring: kahoot.com/, www.mentimeter.com/, jamboard.google.com/.
- 9) Be mindful that not everyone is online. Utilize printed newsletters, phone trees, and the power of the hand-written letter!

REPORT OF THE COMPENSATION AID TASK FORCE

2021 NJ Synod Assembly

Since its establishment at the 1994 Synod Assembly, the Compensation Aid Task Force has received \$1,530,011.50 from legacy gifts, congregations, and individuals of the NJ Synod. In addition, there was \$72,566.48 of net investment income.

2020 Receipts: A total of \$7,725.85 was received. This includes contributions from one pastor and 13 congregations.

2020 Disbursements: \$207,021.96 in grant money was given to four congregations and in matching funds to the NJ Synod *Excellence in Ministry Unleashed* initiative.

2020 Balance: \$452,993.30

This fund was established to supplement the compensation of pastors receiving a salary of 20% or more below Synod guidelines and assist retired pastors whose pension income is inadequate. Over the years, it has also been used to help first-call pastors reduce student loan debt.

Along with processing applications for grants and consulting with congregations that apply, the Task Force encourages congregations to contribute to the Compensation Aid Fund an amount equal to 1% of their pastor's "Defined Compensation" as determined by the ELCA's pension and health plan. Eligible congregations and pastors are invited to contact the office of the Bishop or Pastor James Egan for more information. Thanks to Lois Parrett, Synod bookkeeper, for assisting the Task Force by recording receipts and disbursements.

Thanks to the congregations of the Synod and individuals who have contributed over the years and to congregations that have directed a legacy gift to the fund. Your generous sharing has made it possible to lessen the financial stress of those in the ordained ministry.

REPORT OF THE CONSTITUTION REVIEW COMMITTEE 2021 NJ Synod Assembly

Greetings from the Constitution Review Committee,

The Constitution Review Committee has the responsibility to review the synod constitution to be sure that the document is up to date with the churchwide constitution. The Committee also ensures that any changes and updates made to this constitution adhere to the ELCA Constitution for Synods as adopted by the ELCA Churchwide Assemblies.

In accordance with the ELCA 2019 Churchwide Assembly we noted the following:

1. In accordance with †S18.11., Certain sections of this constitution incorporate and record therein required provisions of the constitution and bylaws of this church. If such provisions are amended by the Churchwide Assembly, corresponding amendments shall be introduced at once into this constitution by the secretary of this synod upon receipt of formal certification thereof from the secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America. The certification was received in August of 2019 and the NJ Synod constitution was updated at that time to reflect the required provisions.

NO VOTE IS REQUIRED.

2. In accordance with †\$18.12., Whenever the secretary of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America officially informs this synod that the Churchwide Assembly has amended the *Constitution for Synods*, this constitution may be amended to reflect any such amendment by a majority vote at any subsequent meeting of the Synod Assembly without presentation at a prior Synod Assembly. An amendment that is identical to a provision of the *Constitution for Synods* shall be deemed to have been ratified upon its adoption by this synod. The notification was received in August of 2019 and the NJ Synod constitution was updated at that time to include the amendments.

Recommendation:

That the synod assembly adopt the amendments to the NJ Synod Constitution, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions to include the amendments to the ELCA Constitution for Synods that were adopted by the 2019 Churchwide Assembly.

In addition, the following amendments to the *NJ Synod Constitution, Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions* are noted:

3. In accordance with †\$18.31. This synod may adopt continuing resolutions not in conflict with this constitution or its bylaws or the constitution, bylaws, and continuing resolutions of the churchwide organization. Such continuing resolutions may be adopted or amended by a majority vote of the Synod Assembly or by a two-thirds vote of Synod Council. The Synod Council adopted, by a two-thirds vote, continuing resolutions †\$6.06.A and †\$7.21.B to reflect resolutions brought forward at the 2019 Synod Assembly.

NO VOTE IS REQUIRED.

The Constitution Review Committee also has the responsibility to review the congregational constitutions to be sure that the documents are up to date with the churchwide constitutions. The Committee ensures that any changes and updates made to these constitutions adhere to the ELCA Constitution for Synods and the ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations as adopted by the ELCA Churchwide Assemblies. Please note that when amendments are proposed, , except for mandatory updates resulting from ELCA Churchwide Assembly actions, the team will make recommendations concerning wording, applicability, and concurrence with constitutional requirements of the ELCA, the synod, and a congregations' own constitution. Our constitutions are tools which, when used well, enhance our mission in serving our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ.

The Constitution Review team is here to help you comply with ELCA requirements. If the congregation uses the <u>ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations in its entirety without changes</u> the Constitution Committee review is only required to verify the information. Approval is not required. Similarly, if the Bylaws and Continuing Resolutions are in compliance with the congregational constitution, the Constitution Committee review is primarily for verification and not for approval. Please be aware that the current **ELCA Model Constitution for Congregations** is 2019 and the next Churchwide assembly is scheduled for 2022.

The review team had the pleasure of reviewing constitutions for over 20% of our congregations and we look forward to continuing this process for all congregations. Please refer to the Secretary's page on the NJ Synod website for the current Model Constitution and instructions on how to update/change a congregational constitution. REPORT OF EMU.NJ EXCELLENCE IN MINISTRY, UNLEASHED



2021 NJ Synod Assembly

Live, Love, Lead Generously

By a coincidence of scheduling, EMU was able to stage two in person events in 2020 before the world went digital in March. The first was actually two concluding sessions of Creating Generous Congregations series begun in the winter of 2019. We were pleased to work with The Lake Institute on Faith and Giving and the ELCA to bring this multi session discussion of generosity to congregations of the New Jersey Synod for a third time. The second event titled Death and Taxes was offered to ordained clergy in mid career and covered savings and tax issues. The Christ Center at CrossRoads was an ideal location for this helpful event.

In the Fall 2020 we offered our first on line event. It was billed as a mini retreat for pastors managing organizational change. We looked at three case studies of organizations that recently have undergone significant change. Each case was presented by a person instrumental in leading that change in their organization. The first case was a congregation in the Synod, the second was a LEAMNJ, and the final case was a United Lutheran Seminary. The willingness of each presenter to share an unvarnished examination of the challenges they faced was vitally important to the success of the event. It was encouraging to hear how set backs are not at all unusual.

The Synod Council asked us to address financial hardships faced by our ordained leaders as a result of the Covid pandemic. This request came with a \$100,000 allocation from the Synod and required approval from the Lilly Foundation who funds much of the work of the EMU project. We began making grants in June to assist clergy who faced loss of income or increased expenses due to the pandemic. The grants are designed to be flexible to respond to needs as they present themselves and are still available. Or past menu of savings incentives and educational debt relief grants continued as outlined in the chart below.,

REPORT OF FISCAL MANAGEMENT, ADMINISTRATION, AND PROPERTY COMMITTEE 2021 NJ Synod Assembly

NJ Synod's Constitution provides a guiding principle for the mission of FMAP: "Since the congregations, synods, and churchwide organization are interdependent expressions that share in God's mission, all share in the responsibility to develop, implement, and strengthen the financial support of the whole church. The gifts and offerings of the members of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America are given to support all parts of this church, the unity in this church should be evidenced in determining each part's share of the gifts and offerings."

The core values of our individual members, congregations, the NJ Synod, the ELCA and the church worldwide are dependent on the physical and financial resources necessary to carry out our missions. FMAP's responsibility as a committee reporting directly to the NJ Synod Council is to carefully monitor and manage our resources to the best of our ability to optimize the success of the missions, objectives and values to which we all ascribe. Our committee's focus is on supporting these missions as FMAP's video report on the NJ Synod Assembly website illustrates (https://youtu.be/9tWAIbN907M). Yes, we have strict fiscal responsibilities to adhere to, but that is not the ultimate objective of our committee.

The specific actions undertaken by FMAP and approved by Synod Council are detailed in the consolidated minutes of the NJ Synod Council meetings found in the bulletin of reports. A total of 5 FMAP meetings were held mostly via Zoom in 2020 (February 6, April 2, June 4, August 27 and November 24). Minutes and agendas for these meetings are available upon request.

The year was not without its challenges (and opportunities) due to the COVID19 pandemic. Financially, Mission Support giving was down in 2020 from the year before which meant some belt tightening on expenses. Our Treasurer Jim Harris, Bishop Bartholomew, Lois Parrett and the rest of the staff were very successful in managing us through this unexpected financial situation with relatively minor impact on our mission work.

Another result of the pandemic was interest by congregations in the COVID19 Emergency Relief for New Jersey Synod Congregations which FMAP manages. This program was created to "make available loans for congregations experiencing financial hardship due to COVID19". During 2020 the committee approved 19 loans totaling \$117,000 to synod congregations, mostly to invest in live streaming equipment to broadcast their worship services, Sunday Church School, or hold meetings to continue addressing the spiritual and business needs of their congregation during the pandemic. Anecdotally we are hearing that these investments will be leveraged long after the pandemic to broaden the reach of their congregational ministries through live streaming.

A great deal of gratitude is due to the members of the committee and staff who serve and support FMAP faithfully: The Rev. Tracie Bartholomew (Bishop), Rev. REPORT OF THE NEW JERSEY SYNOD FUND FOR MISSION

2021 NJ Synod Assembly

The New Jersey Synod Fund for Mission is an endowment fund providing resources for mission-related projects of the New Jersey Synod that might otherwise go unmet. Begun with proceeds from the sale of former LCA church properties, it continues gratefully to receive and faithfully to invest funds granted to it from bequests to the Synod. Grants are made, ranging from 3% to 6% of the corpus annually. The Fund's Management Committee receives and evaluates proposals from Synod program units, mission clusters, congregations, officers and Synod Council and makes recommendations to the Synod Council for funding. Special categories in the fund are reserved for Music Grants in support of the development of church musicians and for Handicap Accessibility.

These criteria guide us: (proposals need not meet every criterion):

1. The proposed program shall be one that could not normally be funded by the operating budget of the Synod or ELCA Churchwide Ministries, or by the agency for whom the grant is sought. (Frequently the committee is able to respond to the need represented in grant proposals that are submitted by finding other appropriate funding sources.)

2. Preference is given for:

- initiating new mission ventures: providing seed money and/or leveraging other funds for mission.
- projects having a direct relationship to the urban character of the Synod.
- projects that are inclusive with regard to color, language, ages, and sex of persons.
- projects that address the needs of the disadvantaged, especially the poor, mentally and physically challenged, and the powerless.
- projects that enable the Synod to develop new ministries to meet needs occasioned by societal change.

Grants approved for 2020/2021 projects totaled \$111,000 and were in support of applications for Synod Council Mission Initiatives, the Bishop's Mission Subvention Fund, Advocacy and Social Justice, Lutheran Episcopal Advocacy Ministry NJ, NJ Synod Coaching Ministry, Hunger/Outreach Ministries and Youth and Family Ministry. No grant proposals were received for music programs or improving accessibility.

Management Committee members can give counsel to those interested in preparing a grant application. The submission deadline is September 1st. Payment is made following Synod Council approval. Grant recipients are requested to evaluate their respective projects for report to the Fund for Mission Management Committee by June 1 of the year following receipt of the funds.

Thanks to all the members of the Management Committee for their wise guidance in the stewardship of this Fund. We are indebted to Bishop Tracie Bartholomew for her leadership, Treasurer James Harris for his invaluable work and report of it, and to LuAnn Barnes, Administrative Assistant and Confidential Secretary to the Bishop for her excellent assistance in preparing our minutes and correspondence!

REPORT OF CROSS ROADS CAMP AND RETREAT CENTER

2021 NJ Synod Assembly Cross Roads 2020 Annual Report

Cross Roads Camp and Retreat Center is an ecumenical ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Newark and the New Jersey Synod. We are *your* camp and retreat ministry.

PROGRAM: In March all regular programming came to an abrupt halt. Retreats were canceled for the remainder of the year. In-person summer camp and day camp were canceled. However, the ministry of Cross Roads continued. Summer programming and online weekly faith formation was developed through the Bold Transformational Faith. Retreats and spiritual formation for children, youth, and adults moved online and have been for many a spiritual lifeboat during this pandemic. The Gap Year program was an alternative for young adults. Through creativity and sheer determination, the ministry of Cross Roads has never stopped.

FISCAL MANAGEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT: In 2020 our operational income was down 87% from 2019, due to the cancelation of all retreats and in-person camp activities from early March through the year's end. We are extremely grateful for the generosity of both the New Jersey Synod and Diocese of Newark who each made substantial challenge grants in 2020. We are also grateful to the many individuals and congregations who were very generous in their support of the ministry. Yet, while our gift income more than doubled from the year before, we had to furlough staff and drastically slash our budget/expenses. We are very grateful for all of the support in 2020, and will need the same level of commitment moving forward until our regular programing and retreats return. Additionally, to make summer camp happen this summer we will have significant COVID-necessitated enhancements with the accompanying costs.

STAFF: This year we celebrated ten years with our Executive Director, Anthony Briggs, who has done an amazing job navigating and leading through this unprecedented season. He has spent countless hours and his considerable gifts find ways for the ministry of Cross Roads, camping across the church, and youth ministry in our congregations to be sustained. We have been so blessed by all of our staff. They have served faithfully throughout this tough year. We owe them all a huge debt of gratitude.

BOARD: Meeting regularly throughout the pandemic, the Board of Trustees gave oversight and guidance to the ministry of Cross Roads, including adopting revised Bylaws and are working toward more effective governance.

Over the past year Cross Roads struggled, adapted, and ultimately thrived in spite of such extraordinary situation. Above all, in 2020 Cross Roads continued to live out its mission of serving people of all ages in engagement of spiritual renewal, growth, and joy in new and varied ways. As we look to the future, we count on your continued support and trust the Holy Spirit to lead us to expand the ministry of sharing the love of Jesus Christ across this region.

Celebrating our fifth anniversary as a financial ministry of the ELCA

The ELCA Federal Credit Union was founded in 2016 to provide a fuller suite of financial products and services to the members, congregations and ministries of the ELCA. The Credit Union offers a rich variety of products—from savings and checking accounts and CDs ... to loans, lines of credit and credit cards. The Credit Union is the first of the ELCA's financial ministries to offer loans to individuals. Because we exist solely to serve our members, we can offer better rates and lower fees than many traditional banks, and we have demonstrated success in providing significant savings to our borrowers. Our strong online presence allows members to access their funds anytime, anywhere—as consumers expect today.

In the early days of the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, as congregations and ministries closed their doors, the Credit Union responded swiftly to growing needs for financial assistance. We took the step to become certified by the Small Business Administration to provide loans through the Paycheck Protection Program, a federal program of the CARES Act. These PPP loans—continuing compensation for pastors and staff and covering other operating expenses during the pandemic—have proved to be a lifeline for congregations and ministries experiencing diminished revenue during this unprecedented time. Cooperating with our financial partner, the Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA, we have already provided more than 350 PPP loans totaling almost \$14 million to congregations and ministries across the church. We continue working together to help PPP loan recipients file applications for loan forgiveness.

In 2021, we ushered in the third cohort of participants in the ELCA's Resourceful Servants program, designed to improve financial wellness and assist rostered leaders in building emergency savings funds. In this matching program, ELCA rostered leaders make ongoing deposits to their Credit Union emergency savings accounts, and our partner MIF matches those funds up to an established amount. Together, we already have served more than 400 rostered ministers who, collectively, have made emergency savings deposits of more than \$1 million.

Membership is open to every ELCA member, synod, congregation and ministry—and their employees.



The Lutheran Episcopal Advocacy Ministry of New Jersey (LEAMNJ) was planning on expanding into a new multi faith advocacy organization that planned to raise up a new generation of leaders in New Jersey.

We had planned to engage emerging leaders—as identified by participating graduate schools, universities, colleges and supporting congregations—in learning, practicing, organizing, and leading a new nonprofit organization, which intended to have as its mission faith-based advocacy. In addition to guiding the state-level advocacy and educational efforts of the organization, we intended that the emerging leaders would develop collegial relationships with their peers from a wide variety of faith communities throughout New Jersey. Through this model, our plan was not only to raise up individual leaders, but strengthen interfaith relationships thereby contributing to a more robust voices for justice in New Jersey.

Because of COVID, our plan to launch this new organization in the fall of 2020 was put on hold. LEAMNJ reorganized; we are now known as Lutherans Engaging in Advocacy Ministry. To manage fiscal realities, the Executive Director's position was shifted to a part time position, the website was redeveloped, and new legislative priorities have been established to reflect the needs of vulnerable communities and institutional racism in our state.

Advocacy during the time of COVID.

We have been building a new membership base and providing education, information and advocacy opportunities for our members. We have worked remotely and with on-line formats during the pandemic. Join us, <u>register</u> here! Opportunities to participate include:

Recap of legislative successes in 2019-2021

LEAMNJ has worked with legislators, direct service providers, other advocacy groups, and our own community of advocates year-round on projects related to our four issue priorities. Minimum Wage: What We Did:

LEAMNJ worked with advocacy partners to negotiate with legislators using polling data to demonstrate the strong support among New Jerseyans for a minimum wage increase. We also collaborated with Make the Roads,



an immigrant youth organization to organize against a proposal to carve youth workers out of the minimum wage increase.


What We Accomplished:


In early 2019, we joined many other advocacy partners to help pass a law to raise the minimum wage to \$10 per hour beginning on July 1, 2019 and then to \$11 per hour on Jan. 1, 2020. Currently, the minimum wage is set to increase \$1 every year until it reaches \$15 per hour in 2024. Work still needs to be done to address those workers who were carved out of this increase: notably tip workers and farm workers.

Ending Hunger in NJ: May of 2019

LEAMNJ helped get the following bills related to hunger advocacy signed into law:

- ➤ A4702 "Hunger-Free Campus Act": this established a grant program to address food insecurity among students enrolled in public institutions of higher education.
- > A4704: this established a food desert produce pilot program.





- ➤ AJR174: This urged large food retailers in the state to reduce food waste and provided practical strategies for accomplishing this.
- ➤ AJR175: This urged the Chief Innovation Officer of the state to prioritize enhancement of the NJOneApp to include all State anti-hunger programs



Equal Pay: July 25, 2019 What We Did:

In 2019, LEAMNJ collaborated with female legislators to hold a legislative day at the Capitol where hundreds of advocates came to talk to law makers about paid sick leave, gender pay equity, and family leave legislation.

What We Accomplished:

This event helped to get equal pay legislation signed into law that will prevent employers from asking about wage and salary history of workers to combat this discriminatory practice and promote equal pay and gender equity within the workforce. This is one more step forward for women who continue to be underpaid and undervalued in the workplace.



Gun Violence Protection: July 2019

What We Did:

Gun violence prevention was enhanced in NJ as a result of a coalition of group's efforts. LEAMNJ partnered with Cease Fire New Jersey in their ongoing work around safe storage. Together, they mobilized public opinion through letters to the

editors, rally's and countless legislative visits to demonstrate to legislators that most New Jerseyans want stricter gun laws.

What We Accomplished:,

Bills were signed into law that expand the type of crimes that bar someone from owning a gun in New Jersey, that attempt to curtail gun trafficking from other states, and that aim to prevent suicide.

The most notable measure signed into law in 2019 was a bill that Senator Weinberg,



along with several advocacy groups, helped to pass. P.L. 2019 makes it more possible for "smart guns," which can be fired only by their designated owners, to be made available in NJ. These guns are designed to be safer than typical handguns, using fingerprint and other identification technology to prevent accidental shootings

Solitary Confinement:

others would be at substantial risk of serious harm. The law also prohibits isolated confinement for vulnerable populations — those younger than 21 and older than 65 and those who are LGBTQ, ar**What We Did:** In July of 2019, LEAMNJ worked to raise



awareness of the inhumane treatment of New Jersey inmates by leading forums in both adult congregations and youth groups, and organizing groups

to call, email, write letters, and put up banners in church yards calling for an end to solitary confinement. We also build a replica of a solitary confinement cell at a synod assembly so that congregants could see and experience this form of inhumane treatment for themselves.

What We Accomplished:

LEAMNJ worked together with many other groups to pass a law restricting the use of isolated confinement unless there is reasonable cause to believe that the inmate or e pregnant, or with disabilities — but does allow it in rare, specified circumstances. The new law requires state prisons and county jails to screen inmates for mental illness before and during isolated confinement and collect and report data on the use of such confinement.



Wage Theft: Aug. 2019

What We Did:

LEAMNJ focused on education and awareness by allying with organized labor to hold small rallies all over the state, bringing attention to the many different manifestations of wage theft and how many people are affected. Particular effort was made towards educating New Jersey's legislators on

this often unrecognized issue.

What We Accomplished:

LEAMNJ advocated for the enhancement of enforcement of New Jersey's wage and hour laws by holding employers accountable for unpaid wages, benefits, or overtime pay as required by law through increased damages and fines, which make victims of wage theft eligible to receive both the wages owed and liquidated damages of 200 percent of wages owed.



Voting Rights Restoration Law: Dec. 2019

What We Did:

New Jersey has the nation's highest rate of racial disparity in its state prison system. A 2016 report revealed that there were 12 times as many African American people incarcerated as white people. In response to this crisis, LEAMNJ

collaborated with the legislative Black Caucus and other advocacy groups to mobilize public opinion against this issue by holding press conferences, writing letters to the editors, educating faith leaders, hosting prayer vigils and organizing congregants to call and email legislators to restore voting rights to those with criminal convictions.

What We Accomplished:

These efforts resulted in the passing of legislation that restores voting rights to more than 80,000 people who are on probation or parole in New Jersey.

Driver's License in NJ: Just before Christmas 2019

What We Did:

LEAMNJ worked with immigrant rights groups to hold rallies at the state house, hold marches around the state, make LOTS of legislative visits and phone calls, and share petitions from communities of faith calling for driver's license reform (one signed by hundreds of NJ Lutherans!)



What We Accomplished:

Legislation was signed into law that provided the opportunity for all residents to get a driver's license in New Jersey. This has been hailed as a public safety victory; finally, all drivers will be tested, insured and legally able to drive making our streets safer. Governor Murphy at the bill signing said, "Today is a simple recognition that our immigrant communities — each of

you — are a vital part of our state and our economy." Now, however, regulations are threatening to undo much of this law's success. Read more here.

Criminal Justice Reform: What We Did:

LEAMNJ worked closely with New Jersey's governor to address the fast moving legislation being developed around prison safety. Particular attention was devoted to the Edna Mahan Correctional Facility for Women.

What We Accomplished:

Legislation was signed into law to make NJ's prisons and jails safer for those who are incarcerated, especially in women's prisons. A



law is now in place that requires reporting of inmate abuse by employees of State correctional facilities and establishes a reporting and investigation program and process. LEAMNJ also helped to pass legislation that limits cross gender strip searches in State correctional facilities. Another measure has become law that requires correctional police officers to receive 20 hours in-service training, including four hours in prevention of sexual misconduct, non-fraternization, and manipulation. However, there is still more work to be done to help change prison culture in New Jersey.



Housing:

What We Did: This "Lobby Day at the Capitol" event gathered advocates at the state house to visit with lawmakers in the halls, testify at legislative hearings, and educate the legislature and the faith community about the need for housing that all New Jersyans can afford.

What We Accomplished:

LEAMNJ worked to expand Code Blue Laws. A measure was passed that requires a declaration of the Code Blue alert when the National Weather Service predicts temperatures of 32 degrees Fahrenheit or lower. Another measure authorizes certain health care and social service resources to be made available during Code Blue alert.

Child Poverty Advocacy: What We Accomplished:

LEAMNJ worked with New Jersey
Policy Perspective and the Anti
Poverty Network to increase the
income eligibility thresholds for the
Temporary Assistance for Needy
Families (TANF) Program. Increase
SNAP benefits, fund Cover All Kids,
eliminate EITC age restrictions.
We also worked on increasing the
Child Care Tax Credit



2021 Budget Advocacy (over the summer 2020)



What we did: We advocated for funding of the Affordable Housing Trust Fund to be included in the budget. For a TANF and EITC increase for those who qualify. Funding health insurance for all Kids in NJ, and the addition of a Millionaire's Tax to raise revenues in the state and help make pension payments for state employees. When NJ's treasury is healthy, vulnerable New Jersyans receive better support!

COVID Criminal Justice Advocacy October 2020

What We Did:

Along with phone calls and zoom meetings with legislators and the Governor's office, LEAMNJ worked with coalition partners to gather participants and make signs for a COVID-safe "Funeral Procession" to raise awareness of the alarmingly



high rates of COVID cases in NJ prisons and jails.

What We Accomplished:

LEAMNJ and our advocacy partners succeeded in getting Bill S2519 (the Emergency Release Program) signed into law. Under the bill, public health emergency credits are awarded to any adult inmate or juvenile who is within 365 days of their scheduled release. This measure helps protect elderly and other high-risk prisoners and stop the further spread of the COVID-19 pandemic.



October 2020 COVID Workplace Advocacy

What We Did: COVID-19 has posed challenges, but we've been able to find effective socially distant alternatives for many of our advocacy strategies! Along with our coalition partners, we advocated for emergency protections for workers through

several on-line meetings with the Governor's staff.

What We Accomplished: On October 28, 2020, New Jersey Governor Phil Murphy signed Executive Order #192, which mandated new health and

safety protocols to protect New Jersey's workers during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) increased: (see report) Aug. 2020

Increases to benefit amounts finally became a reality in NJ, this long needed increase will ensure that no families



remain in deep poverty, (defined as having income below half the federal poverty level). LEAMNJ worked with New Policy Perspective and the Anti Poverty Network to increase the income eligibility thresholds for the program so more people will be able to qualify. The law also expands eligibility to include individuals enrolled in institutions of higher education and certain immigrants who are in the country legally but currently disqualified from the program. And it will expand the types of activities that can fulfill the program's work requirements to encourage more education and job training, this will help people ultimately get better, more sustainable employment.

And the work goes on...

Emergency Assistance Eligibility to Persons with Past Drug Distribution Convictions, S805 (Cunningham)—Currently, individuals convicted of an offense involving the possession of a controlled dangerous substance are permanently ineligible for benefits. This bill revises these restrictions to provide that anyone who is convicted of an offense involving the use,



possession, or distribution of a controlled dangerous substance will be eligible for general assistance benefits under the Work First New Jersey program if the individual completes a drug treatment program or otherwise qualifies for one of the current statutory exceptions.

EITC Expansion-

Remove all age restrictions from existing regulations, and expand eligibility.



The People's Bill-

Provide repayment process for tenants and homeowners who are behind on their housing payments due to Covid.





Emergency protections for Farmworkers-

Make it more possible for farm workers to

receive Unemployment compensation, worker protections, and non retaliation support. As well as access to vaccinations and medical care



Prescription Drug price ceilings-

Create a board to determine a ceiling of common prescription drug prices.

Expanded reform in NJ Prisons and Jails.

The need for good government that is transparent and truly open for involvement by all New Jersans.

Progress and Change in the Archives by Kim-Eric Williams

t is hard to imagine that it was thirty-five years ago when I was first made aware of the Lutheran Archives Center at Philadelphia. Pastor Robert Brusic of Trinity Church in New Haven, Conn., was then president of the board and invited me to attend as the president of the New England Lutheran Historical Society. As a Church historian, I found the meetings fascinating with such luminaries as Helmut Lehmann and E. Theodore (Ted) Bachman, to say nothing of the extensive reports by curator John E. Peterson. By 1989 I joined the Board, initially representing New England and later Southeastern Pennsylvania.

In the fall of 1999, I was asked to become editor of a new publication that was to be sent to all pastors and leaders in the Northeast. The Archives Advocate became a vehicle for the Archives to spread the word about its work and to honor significant ministries in the Northeast. It was particularly important when we were fundraising for the restoration of the Muhlenberg Journals (2009-11) and for our Justus Falckner celebration and publications in 2003.

With the building of the Brossman Center on the Philadelphia campus we were able to finally move out of our cramped and outgrown quarters in the basement of the Krauth Memorial Library in 2005. It was at this time that I became a salaried part-time employee of the Archives, assisting with the move. There was

As we enter the second year of the COVID-19 pandemic, the Lutheran Archives Center continues to prepare for the future and making our collection more accessible than ever. Our staff is hard at work on multiple projects that will take us through 2021 and beyond. With the need for remote access more important than ever, we are prioritizing efforts to get our collections database online by the end of this year. Stay tuned as we progress towards this goal.

Danielle McCleary, a ULS graduate, is wrapping up a project to process the papers of Rev. Henry Eyster Hornwhose ministry covered more than seventy years. Although the Archives is best known for housing congregational records, we also preserve the personal papers of various Lutheran ministers and laypeople. As we process these papers, finding aids will be made and put on our website for researchers to explore. Danielle's next big project will be working with the contents of the Augustana Museum (see image, left), which will be photographed, cataloged, and shared online in a searchable database. She will also continue work on our research library, in particular the collection of Swedish books, and adding that information into our forthcoming online database. We are grateful to the Augustana Institute for their support of these efforts.

Sheila Joy, our associate archivist, handles our genealogy requests and research inquiries—which have increased

Greetings from our new Archivist By Sheila Joy

t has been a very productive year in the archives! There has been exponential progress made in both processing collections and the creation of finding aids and inventories. One of my first tasks was to create a procedure so that every new collection we receive is properly accessioned and prepared for processing. Since my arrival, we have received more than two dozen new unprocessed collections—sixteen of them congregation records—that have been put through this new procedure.

Danielle McCleary, a ULS graduate, is making great progress in processing the Henry Horn Collection. She has started a finding aid which will be available on our website when completed. ULS student Courtney Smith is discovering many new treasures while inventorying our oversized records and artifacts—thanks to an ELCA regional archives grant.

Many congregation collections were processed this year, including Epiphany Lutheran Church (Roxborough, PA). Other records nearing completion are Grace (Norristown, PA), Holy Cross (Philadelphia), Zion (Nesquehoning, PA), and St. Paul (Catasauqua, PA). All of this progress could not be made with the help of our archives assistants, Courtney and Danielle, and our gracious volunteers, Linda Beck and Phyllis Linn.

Research inquiries have also been flooding in almost daily. With people staying at home due to the pandemic, there has been a surge in family history research. Much time goes into carefully tending to these requests, including replying to emails and phone calls, conducting reference work, checking inventory listings, carrying out research, and making high-quality scans.

This uptick in research inquiries has made evident the need to create collection inventory listings for the

public. Having such lists available on our website would allow researchers to see what records we have without needing to contact us first. I am creating these listings at the county level based on the many questions from patrons asking what records we have from a certain county. Berks County, PA has been completed and is available in PDF format. Next up will be Southeastern and Northeastern PA Synod counties, New Jersey Synod, and so on. A list of our holdings for St. Michaels & Zion, Philadelphia, is also now available as it is one of our most highly requested collections.

On top of all this, we manage to squeeze in weekly Facebook posts to maintain and grow our online presence. Folks seem to particularly enjoy our quick archives tips and Friday Finds from the Vault. The impact of COVID-19 also continues to be felt. All in-person work has been suspended since November 21 in accordance with the ULS campus shutdown and Philadelphia's Safer at Home restrictions. The safety and wellbeing of our community and staff is of utmost importance and I am grateful that there is plenty of work that can be done remotely.

The Henry Eyster Horn Collection

√his fall I started processing the papers of Rev. Henry Eyster Horn (1913-2007). Our new archivist, Sheila Joy, trained me on the ins and outs of best archival processing practices. Thankfully, Henry Horn was also a highly organized man. He indexed just about everything, including his notebooks on readings, sermons, lectures, course materials, correspondence, and more. As I await my first call, I enjoy the eye-opening experience of learning how useful it is in the long-term to stay organized. Horn's focus on organizing has helped me understand how he stayed engaged as a father, pastor, advocate, friend, and chair of several committees throughout his lifetime.

Researchers using this collection will learn about Horn's extensive ministry in Boston, Georgia, and

Churchwide. It was refreshing for me to discover that Horn was an advocate for the ordination of women, writing several essays and appeals to help push it forward. His advocacy did not stop there. Horn did not shy away from writing, lecturing, and engaging in committees that talked about topics such as racism, sexism, and homophobia in our Church and nation and what to do about it. Horn was also very passionate about Campus Ministry. With its inception in the 1970s, Horn was a major voice in this movement. He wrote several papers, gave lectures, and served as a delegate to the World Council of Churches for Campus Ministry.

Many readers likely know that Horn lived to celebrate his 70th ordination anniversary before he died in 2007. He was a faith leader during such a pivotal time in our nation's history and worked tirelessly to ensure that all were welcome in our Church for decades. I have learned so much from this project and think that all of us can glean some wisdom from Horn. Especially in our current global situation, living out our faith publicly and advocating for others is something we are all called to as Children of God.

greatly over the past year. She is compiling county-by-county listings of our congregational records. She has also compiled a detailed list of the records we hold from St. Michael's and Zion, Philadelphia. These will be made available on our website and should be of great help to genealogists and researchers to see what relevant records we may or may not have at the archives. Sheila has also implemented a streamlined process for documenting all incoming collections and has worked with multiple synod offices to share guidelines for the preservation of congregational records.

ULS student Courtney Smith has been exploring every nook and cranny of our main vault, searching for oversize objects to inventory, photograph, and catalogue. These objects include everything from communion vessels to shovels used in groundbreaking ceremonies as well as many framed documents, artworks, and photographs. Because the compact shelving in our main vault is designed for storing standard size bankers boxes, oversize objects were often relegated to back corners or squeezed onto bottom shelves where they were crowded and inaccessible. Now they are being relocated to more commodious shelving in a second vault; some oversize documents and photographs are also being unframed and placed into archival folders within a large flat file drawer unit. We are grateful for an ELCA regional archives grant to help fund this project.

To help us continue with these efforts to preserve and share the diverse collections in our care as widely as possible, we need your help. 

Oversize Artifacts Project By Courtney Smith

am excited to spend my final year of seminary back in the Archives after completing my pastoral internship in Massachusetts last year. My current project is working to catalog and organize the oversized artifacts in our collection—many of them having come along with congregational records—thanks to an ELCA regional archives grant. These could be photographs, communion vessels, awards, plaques, and other important mementos that help tell the history of a congregation. The Archives recently acquired some extra space in a second vault which has allowed me to process these items and work to get a better understanding of everything we have.

We have established a section in Vault 2 that is rapidly becoming home to framed artwork, oversized objects ranging from chairs to signs, photograph collections, and important historical documents such as certificates, charters, and architectural blueprints. Every item is given a number for tracking and is placed in archival folders for safety. The hope is to get most of these items into suitable archival boxes for their long-term preservation as it becomes clear what the scope of our oversize holdings is and resources become available.

It is truly a delight to look at these old photographs and see the way churches did ministry in the past. In 2021 we are all figuring out how to be the body of Christ and do ministry together while being physically apart. Looking back on these old ministry programs has been a constant reminder

a lot of work to do. We inherited an unpainted and unfurnished basement. It took us three years until we were ready for an official dedication. The closing of Nativity Church in Chester, Pa. and Holy Cross in Philadelphia came just as were searching for office furnishings, and their ministries live on every day as we continue to use their desks, tables, and chairs. A talented seminarian even painted the walls of our new space, which were further enlivened by artwork found among our holdings.

Our new movable shelf system enabled us to organize the collection for the first time in some formal way and to set up a research library. This was a dream come true. We had more space than we needed, allowing us to invite other non-profits to rent space and provide a new revenue source. The Episcopal Diocese of Pennsylvania was our first tenant and then the

Swedish Colonial Society and Gloria Dei Old Swedes Church. The addition of the Metropolitan New York Synod's archives in 2013 fulfilled our goal to serve as the archives for the entire Northeast region.

A special interest of mine was the Augustana Institute, founded by the Seminary and the Archives in 2009 with the idea of setting aside a room as a museum to celebrate the more than 200 congregations of the Swedish tradition in the Northeast. I had served two years in the Church of Sweden and was teaching Swedish at the University of Pennsylvania so it was a natural connection. In 1995. the Archives inherited 80 archival boxes from the New York and New England Conferences that had been housed at Upsala College. In 2015, we were asked by the Augustana Heritage Association to host their closing gathering the following June. This invitation gave the Augustana Council a new focus and we were able to collect many significant items to display in our Augustana Museum on the third floor of the Brossman Center. It was dedicated by Swedish bishop Jonas Jonsson in 2016 as a part of the Augustana Heritage Gathering.

Now a new chapter is opening for the Archives. We finally have two professional staff members and a dedicated team of student assistants and volunteers to process incoming records. We are digitizing our collection and making progress on many fronts. I have agreed to remain as a nonstipendiary curator of the Augustana Institute and Museum as we continue to find inspiration and renewal from our shared experiences in the past.

Greetings siblings in Christ of the New Jersey Synod,

It has been a difficult year for all of us. Despite restrictive policy changes and the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, however, LIRS has remained committed to our biblical mandate to welcome the stranger.

In the last year:

- 2,782 refugees were welcomed through LIRS affiliates in 23 states.
- 440 unaccompanied migrant children were served through our foster care services and placed in loving homes during and after legal proceedings.
- 9,500 asylum seekers received Safe Release and Post Release services at our Southern border.

Even in these darkest of days, thousands of people from across the country partnered with LIRS to express their support for migrants and refugees through our annual programs and advocacy efforts. The compassion of our neighbors gives us hope, and we are proud to report that in the last year:

- 16,000 holiday cards and 500 gifts were sent to migrant children and families in detention through our annual Hope for the Holidays program.
- More than 600 ELCA clergy and lay leaders signed a letter drafted by the ELCA and LIRS urging Congress to work collaboratively to advance comprehensive immigration legislation.
- LIRS' work was featured on national platforms like NPR, the Washington Post, Center for American Progress, Religion News Service, The Christian Century, and Sojourners.

We are especially grateful for the congregations and communities in the New Jersey Synod who have continued their generous and prayerful support. We could not do this work without you.

Now, that work is expanding. In the coming year, the U.S. expects to welcome 125,000 refugees to our shores. LIRS is actively looking to congregations and faith leaders to partner with us in ways big and small, including donations, volunteer work, and participation in our annual programming. Emmaus: Congregational Discernment Network launches this spring for congregations to discern how they can best walk alongside refugees and migrants in their community, and Stand Up Speak Up, coming in Pentecost, is a new interfaith prayer vigil focused on advocacy. We encourage you to stay up to date on opportunities for individual and congregational engagement at the LIRS Action Center, found at www.lirsconnect.org/get_involved

With your support, we will continue to live our mission: witnessing to God's love for all people, standing with and advocating for migrants and refugees, and transforming communities through ministries of service and justice. Thank you for accompanying LIRS and our migrant and refugee siblings through 2021 and beyond. God bless you.

Lutheran Social Ministries of New Jersey 2021 Report New Jersey Synod Assembly #33

During a year filled with many challenges and uncertainties due to the COVID-19 pandemic, LSMNJ has remained true to its mission. Serving more than 2,500 individuals through senior living, affordable housing, hospice and home care, LSMNJ's everyday heroes continue to ensure our clients' health and safety are their highest priority.

ORGANIZATIONAL HIGHLIGHTS

- When the COVID-19 pandemic hit in March, LSMNJ responded by immediately implementing infection control protocols in all of its senior living and affordable housing locations, including social distancing, mandatory mask wearing, and hand washing. As COVID-19 spread across the state and nation, strict PPE (personal protective equipment) guidelines were implemented and all visitation was suspended at each LSMNJ location. We commend our over 500 employees for their unwavering dedication over the past year. Throughout all of our programs, our employees worked tirelessly to keep residents, patients, and participants safe and to make sure all were well informed, receiving meals, prescriptions, social interaction (virtually with families and friends) and not feeling isolated or alone. We provided thousands of masks to residents we serve in senior living, housing, and our community-based programs.
- ❖ Though the pandemic limited visitor access to Crane's Mill Retirement Community, renovations were able to resume, and the redesign of its main lobby, café/bistro seating area, bar, and entertainment room were completed. Some renovations began in the independent living hallways, which will continue in 2021. Remaining renovations to be completed include the community's main dining room and kitchen, as well as its café/grill. Crane's Mill was proud to receive a GOLD award for the REMODEL/RENOVATION of its Wellness/Aquatic Center from Environments for Aging.
- When COVID-19 spread across North Jersey early in the year, Lutheran Senior LIFE PACE Program at Jersey City had to shift operations to provide 100% home-based care. In doing so, participants received home visitation from nurses and nurse practitioners, physical and occupational therapists, the chaplain, and social workers. Meals and prescriptions were delivered to their doorstep and telehealth (Grandpad® technology) was implemented. LS LIFE also provided safe, door-to-door transportation to those who needed to see the doctor or come to the Center for medical evaluation.
- ❖ In 2020, the **LSMNJ Foundation** received the following grants and donations:
 - AARP Senior Connectedness grant \$20,500 to enable social contact through technology at Mt.
 Olive & Pennsauken affordable senior housing

- ❖ Journey Hospice has been recognized as a Hospice provider that successfully met the Hospice Quality Reporting Program's (HQRP) data reporting requirements by the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS). This recognition applauds Hospice providers for their vigilant attention to compliance and documentation. Journey has offices located in both North and South Jersey and is a participant in Medicare, Medicaid and many private insurances.
- SpiriCare at Home saw an increase in calls for nursing services in the home during the pandemic.
- **LSMNJ** was proud to become recertified as a Great Places To Work[®] organization.
- ❖ In January 2021, LSMNJ began vaccinating staff, residents, and participants within the various programs we provide. We are happy to report that more than half have received their vaccination thus far, with additional vaccination clinics scheduled.

PEOPLE SERVED IN 2020

LSMNJ served 2,572 people and outreached to 2,369 individuals as part of the many programs and services it provides across the state. The lives of New Jersey residents were improved through community services such as; HERO – 142 served, Immigration Legal Services – 333 served, Journey Hospice – 158 served, and SpiriCare at Home – 51 served. 1,045 qualified NJ residents lived in LSMNJ Affordable Housing properties; 835 seniors received residential and health services through Senior Healthcare and Retirement Living programs; and 8 adults with mental health needs lived in specialized long-term housing. Through the gracious efforts of 137 individual volunteers and 35 groups, 2,620 volunteer hours were provided in support of LSMNJ's mission.

MIF provides a range of investments for individuals, congregations and ministries. We put those investments to work to fund building and renovation loans for congregations and ministries.

The result? Impact investments, with a transformative impact on our communities: Expanded worship spaces ... new space for education and youth ministry ... much-needed day care centers for working families ... industrial-grade kitchens and fellowship halls for community meals.



During the year-long pandemic, MIF provided assistance to investors who needed immediate access to their funds and to borrowers who needed flexibility with their loan payments. We collaborated with our ministry partner, the ELCA Federal Credit Union, to offer expedited loans for congregations, ministries and individuals, as well as Paycheck Protection Program loans for congregations and ministries to keep employees on the payroll and continue operations.

Our capabilities and capacity have never been stronger. At year-end 2020, MIF had 883 loans outstanding, totaling \$596.4 million. Investment obligations totaled \$543.1 million. With total assets of \$773.8 million and net assets of \$218.2 million at year-end 2020, MIF maintains a capital ratio of 28.20 percent—positioning MIF in the top tier of well-capitalized church extension funds.

Our steadfast support continues for the members, congregations and ministries of the ELCA and the many ways you care for a world in need. We are honored and humbled to walk alongside you as a trusted partner.

REPORT OF THE NJ DIAKONIA STEERING COMMITTEE

2021 NJ Synod Assembly

Prior to the pandemic lockdown we were able to hold our annual Gathering entitled, *Keeping Your Community Together in Difficult Times*. Fifty participants attended workshops which investigated how to do visitation, witnessing and faith formation when you do not have a full-time minister.

We have begin planning for this year's gathering. This year's Gathering is scheduled to be held on October 2nd and is entitled *Communicating the Gospel*. More information on the workshops will be available via Jersey Jottings shortly.

We have been able to continue conducting classes at two location this year. We are currently working with several bilingual ministers in the synod to reoffer classes in Spanish.

Just like so many other parts of our life, aspects of our diakonia life have had to change or postponed. Unfortunately, our June 2020 graduation had to be cancelled. We are planning to celebrate graduation on June 26th this year. We are anticipating having approximately 10 graduates.

We continue to work with the national diakonia board to insure consistency of curriculum across synods as well as identify ways to expand programs. As a non-profit, self-supporting organization, we continue to try to balance the desire to expand our offerings while attempting to keep our programs affordable for the most students. We would like to thank Synod for its continued support of our important work. Synod support has helped us provide scholarships for students to attend classes as well as keep the costs of our programs down so that more people can participate. We would also like to thank all of the instructors and volunteers who help make our lay education program a success.

President's Report

What is WELCA? What is WELCA? It's an easy way to say Women of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Quite a mouthful, we know. Our organization includes Lutheran women who gather in more than 7,000 locations in the U.S. and the Caribbean, for service, study, advocacy, fellowship and more! WELCA embraces all kinds of ministries that support our mission of mobilizing women to act boldly on their faith in Jesus Christ. There is a place for you in Women of the ELCA.

HOW DOES WELCA WORK?

- Congregational, inter-congregational and special units (about 7,000)
- Synodical Women's Organization (in 64 of the ELCA's 65 synods). Here in NJ there are 24 active units.
- Churchwide Women's Organization

The **congregational**, **inter-congregational** and **special units** are the largest expression of the organization and are the heart of the organization. This is where we grow the organization, inviting women to experience the reconciling and transforming love of God through Jesus Christ, encouraging women to act on their baptismal covenant.

The **synodical women's organizations** (SWOs) establish a partnership with units in their geographic areas and with the churchwide women's organization. **SWOs** exist to support women in congregations. Each SWO has a board whose members are elected at an annual or biennial convention by voting members from units. Each SWO establishes clusters or conferences of units within its geographic area.

Conferences and clusters are groupings of congregations within a synodical organization. While they have no legislative responsibilities, conferences and clusters provide learning opportunities through leadership development, community building, stewardship education, networks for communication and opportunities for joint ministry and action with the guidance of the SWO.

The **churchwide women's organization** (CWO) is the entire organization. Within the churchwide expression of Women of the ELCA, the **triennial convention** is the highest legislative authority; voting members to the convention are elected by synodical organizations. Between conventions, the **churchwide executive board** (volunteers elected by the triennial convention) conducts the business of the organization.

The churchwide executive board hires an executive director to oversee the operations of the CWO; the executive director, in turn, hires staff to assist in that endeavor. The only paid **staff** is located within the CWO. In all other expressions of the organization, volunteers carry out the organization's mission and purpose.

WELCA is the women's ministry organization of the **ELCA**. It is separately incorporated and is not an auxiliary of the church. It is financially independent and responsible for its own financial affairs. Financial support comes from individual and group offerings and gifts.

MESSAGE FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR: Overwhelming!

ear friends of Seafarers International House (SIH):

"Fear not, for I have redeemed you; I have called you by name, you are mine. When you pass through the waters I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not <u>overwhelm</u> you; For I am the Lord your God, the Holy one of Israel, your Savior". Isaiah 43:2-3

Haven't we all felt <u>overwhelmed</u> this past year? And yet, you have helped us weather the storm caused by the pandemic with your <u>overwhelming</u> support ... this imperfect storm that disrupted the lives of so many of us as well as those often unseen seafarers during the crew change crisis and invisible asylum seekers detained in jail-like facilities, while the immigration process grinded to a halt.

You, our supporters, expressed compassion for seafarers and immigrants during the time of crisis by increasing contributions significantly. When we had to cancel our major fundraiser, the



2020 Setting the Course Banquet, individuals, shipping industry partners and unions, decided to send donations instead of buying tickets so that our 6 port chaplains could continue to visit ships that some likened to "floating prisons" because travel bans made crew changes impossible for most.

Spring was financially disastrous as we had to stop operating the guesthouse, which typically subsidizes our mission with about 75% of total income. Tragically, we had to part with our guesthouse staff, first hoping to rehire them in the summer, then by the end of December. Saving our organization when our services are needed most, we received a "gift" in the form of a respite organization (Comunilife) that leased our space from April to July to attend to community members recovering from COVID-19. With that blessing, we were able fulfill our continuing mission to seafarers and immigrants, while contributing the health insurance of the laid-off staff members throughout the year. And all through the pandemic we have been able to house seafarers in a midtown hotel now temporarily known as "SIH relocated".

The Right of Asylum Online Advocacy Event was a great way to reach new friends – over 100 people attended all across the nation with over 2,000 seeing it on social media in the days after. Many participated in lobbying against new asylum rules and sent contributions to support our work with asylum seekers.

When senior groups, businesses, and congregations could not meet in person to assemble Christmas-at-Sea satchels, they contributed financial-

ly and assembled satchels in their homes and, in the end, showed 2,080 seafarers during the Christmas season that their sacrifices are appreciated.

We have been <u>overwhelmed</u> by the gifts of "imperfect storm weatherers" like you who enabled us to serve almost 20,000 people in the ports and at SIH relocated where we now provide lodging and social work assistance.

We thank the amazing individuals, congregations, synods, foundations, shipping industry partners and unions who helped us through the tempest of 2020 and who prepared a solid ground for 2021, where we will continue our service to seafarers in the ports of Baltimore, Philadelphia, New Jersey and CT, and housing seafarers and asylum seekers who are beginning to remerge after the lock-down.



2020 FINANCIAL REPORT

COVID-19 related challenges are reflected in our finances with lodging revenue that accounted for 72% of income last year dropping to just 17% in 2020. Overwhelmingly, it was our supporters' response that enabled us to fulfil our mission with contributions accounting for 34% of income, up from 22% in 2019. Even with the ability to lease the building for three months to a partner organization that took care of COVID-19 patients in recovery, operating expenses exceeded revenues by \$551,048. Program services accounted for 83% percent of expenses with only 17% spent on support services and fundraising. Net Assets increased from \$6,150,830 in 2019 to 6,159,175 in 2020. Psalm 46 reminds us that "God is our strength, a very present help in trouble. We will not fear, though the earth be moved." Since the beginning of the pandemic, it seems as if the ground moves under our feet every day. The seminary has adapted quickly to this new reality, using our pre-existing technology that used to join real classrooms in Philadelphia and Gettysburg to a now-totally virtual learning environment. Also, we encounter the risen Christ together as a community through our zoom worship services, a blessing that has truly unified our students, staff, and faculty across the miles.

President Guy Erwin arrived in last August to begin a new chapter in the seminary's story, introducing a fresh perspective on the needs of the church during such a time as this. Along with Dean Sebastian and the faculty, he welcomed 85 new members to the ULS student body. In January, we welcomed an additional 39 new students. Our overall enrollment is strong: 360 students, including 177 in the Master of Divinity Program (Word and Sacrament), 19 Master of Arts in Ministerial Leadership (Word and Service), and 82 Doctor of Ministry Candidates. Other students are enrolled in the MA, MAPL, STM, and PhD programs. Currently, 56 of our students are concluding their internships. Seventy-five students received diplomas this Spring, enabling them to continue servant leadership in the church. We also celebrate the gifts and service of nondegree students including 24 Affiliates and 33 Certificate course enrollees (CTS, TEEM, CCFF, UTI, and Anglican Studies). We welcomed the regional Bishops to a virtual visit this past February where they met with members of the seminary community and spend time in worship and prayer. We will hopefully return to in-person learning in this coming fall, with events featuring convocation, colloquy, and Dr. Erwin's inauguration (go to www.uls.edu for more information). We strive to be a community that celebrates God's diverse Creation, with intentional focus on inclusivity and equity for all. Last Fall, we created the Office of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion in keeping with a Board of Trustees mandate. Our own Brother Ed Henry was promoted to become VP in this new office.

We are grateful to the Mission Investment Fund of the ELCA, our <u>partner congregations</u>, <u>alumni</u>, individual donors, and synodical support. Thanks to *all* of our donors, we continue to offer up to full tuition for our degree-seeking students with plans to prayerfully provide in decades to come. As a higher educational institution, we were able to receive federal PPP loans/grants which have helped to sustain us despite the economic hardships in our midst. We strive to be faithful stewards of our resources, looking to guidance from the Board of Trustees and the Endowment Board to help with sound fiscal and resource advice. We welcomed Buff Carlson, the Chief Financial Officer, who began working at the seminary in February of 2020, a few days before the pandemic upended our patterns and routines. He continues to work with Advancement team to forge a sustainable financial strategy for faithful ministry to our students now and in the future. In March, we thanked the Rev. Dr. Zimmann for her years of faithful leadership as she departed for a new position as VP of Advancement at Wilson College in Chambersburg, Pennsylvania.

We are thankful for the ELCA synods of Regions 7 & 8 for their faithful accompaniment during these times. Though the earth is always moving, we will not fear, because our partners continue to remind us that God is present amid the challenges we face as we equip the saints for the work of ministry. May God bless you in this moment and strengthen you in the days to come as we continue to encounter Christ when and where we least expect him, but always where he is most-needed.


